Lake County EMA honored as top emergency management agency in Illinois

Chosen by peers from across the state, the Lake County Emergency Management Agency (EMA) has been recognized for setting the standard in emergency preparedness. The agency received the 2025 Emergency Management Agency of the Year award from the Illinois Emergency Services and Management Association (IESMA), a membership group comprised of emergency management professionals, private sector and first responders from across the state.

The recognition highlights Lake County EMA's outstanding leadership, innovation and commitment to public safety and emergency preparedness. The award is presented annually to an agency that demonstrates excellence in emergency management through effective planning, coordination and response to community

"It is truly an honor to receive this award," said Daniel Eder, Manager of Lake County EMA. "Our staff truly cares about our work, and we do our best behind the scenes in support of our partners and communities. Recognition is never expected but it is always appreciated."

The award stems for numerous Lake County EMA achievements, which includes creating a Family Assistance Center (FAC) Plan that helps partners across the country assist family members immediately after a large-scale incident. They also collaborated with Lake County Workforce Development to implement a Work, Earn, Learn (WEL) internship program as well as the SkillBridge program, which provide active military service members an opportunity to gain valuable civilian work experience. Lake County has seen a 90 percent job placement rate for those who completed those programs since they started two years ago. The two agencies also lead a workshop for statewide

emergency management professionals to help them start their own local programs.

Lake County EMA has been actively involved in local, regional and national education, including a presentation with the FBI on support services after a mass-casualty incident at the 2025 IESMA Conference. Lake County EMA was also recognized for helping nearby agencies during several incidents and events, such as the Republican and Democratic National Conventions.

Lake County garnered additional recognition when volunteer Alexandra (Ali) Herzog was honored with the 2025 Student of the Year Award. This is awarded to a student enrolled in an emergency management (or public safety-related degree) program at an accredited institution of higher learning in the State of Illinois who has made significant contributions to the field of emergency management in Illinois or to

Herzog has assisted Lake County operations by drafting a standard operations guide and a draft version of hazard ID card, which will assist emergency operations personnel during incidents. She also provided direct support for events such as the national conventions and severe weather responses within Lake County in 2024. She dedicated over 150 hours of time to Lake County EMA all while pursuing her master's degree in public administration with a concentration in Emergency Management at Southern Illinois University.

"Lake County is lucky to have dedicated volunteers like Ali, who contribute to improving Lake County and its communities," Eder said.

Results are in for Lake County homelessness data

The results are in from the most recent annual assessment of unhoused individuals in Lake County. This assessment, called the Lake County Point-in-Time Count, is a count of sheltered and unsheltered people experiencing homelessness on a single night every January. The annual count occurs not just in Lake County, but in counties across the U.S. and is reported to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

This year's Point-in-Time Count recorded a total of 561 individuals experiencing homelessness across the entirety of Lake County. The total includes people staying in emergency shelters, transitional housing programs and those sleeping in places not meant for human habitation, such as cars, parks or abandoned buildings. Of those counted, 439 individuals were staying in emergency shelters. Another 64 people were in transitional housing, and 58 were living unsheltered. While this total reflects a decrease from last year's count of 705, it remains one of the highest counts in over a decade.

The count was made possible by the dedication of over 100 volunteers who participated in the overnight effort. Volunteers were equipped with a standardized set of questions to ensure consistency and accuracy in data collection. In addition to gathering information, they also distributed care packages to individuals they encountered, providing immediate support and helping to build rapport during the count.

Homelessness is a complex issue with multiple data systems needed to obtain an accurate picture of the overall problem.

"Homelessness isn't just a housing issue, it's a human one," said Sandy Hart, Lake County Board Chair. "Behind every tent or shelter bed is a person or family with a story, a struggle and many of the same hopes we all share. It is important to remember that an individual or family experiencing homelessness looks just like you or me. The job of the County Board and our partners isn't just to manage homelessness, it's to help provide the opportunity to have a place to call home. We are committed to leading this work and know that it will take creative problem-solving and innovative approaches to help our most vulnerable neighbors.'

The County's compiled homeless data includes annualized data on homelessness in Lake County for the year that ended September 30, 2024. The report indicated an increase in overall homelessness, with 1,452 accessing emergency shelter compared to 1,158 in the previous year. The data shows that the number of people experiencing homelessness for the first time is up as well. A total of 1,097 people reported being homeless for the first time, an 18% increase. This year, there were 105 families in shelter compared to 119 in 2024, a decrease of 12 percent from 2024 to the 2025 count.

"The solution to homelessness is housing," said Dominic Strezo, Community Development Administrator. "Housing supply has not kept up with demand, driving up cost beyond the reach of many."

There are countless stories where an individual or family in Lake County ended up being homeless for the first time due to no fault of their own. There must be a network of services readily available to ensure that they can get back on their feet and into a home to call their own.

"While many institutions are contributing to the work of ending homelessness, the efforts of individual community members must also be credited," said Eric Foote, President, Lake County Coalition for the Homeless. "The 2025 Point-in-Time Count was a show of force for the good from Lake County citizens interested in making a difference. The Lake County Coalition for the Homeless sends its appreciation to everyone who helped and a plea for a continued effort to support coalition partners in assisting our vulnerable neighbors, friends and family with their housing

The Board House's new owners welcoming water sports enthusiasts at Three Oaks Rec Area

McKenna Dunn first tried stand-up paddleboarding in 2010 when she was 9 years old and the sport was first gaining popularity in Illinois.

The Crystal Lake resident has been smitten ever since. And, as fortune would have it, when longtime family friends Rick and Laurie Pasturczak were ready to sell their Three Oaks Recreation Area paddleboarding business, Dunn and her father, James Dunn, were ready to take over.

And now, 24-year-old McKenna can't wait to share her passion for paddleboarding with a growing base of water sports fans. The Dunns opened The Board House for their first season May 24, during Memorial Day weekend.

McKenna Dunn is highly familiar with the business. She has been working summers there providing lessons and booking rentals since 2016, and also helped out when it first opened in 2013, she said.

"This is just my happy place," she said on a recent warm afternoon as she removed bubble wrap from some of the business's newest equipment. "Rick and Laurie have turned my dreams into reality.

Dunn — who also is a special education teacher — noted that the lake at Three Oaks, a former gravel pit, is stunningly clean and clear. The shoreline and multiple islands provide habitat for birds and other wild-

You can see way down into it. There are fish and beavers and turtles. You get to see the babies come out. It is just beautiful here."

Dunn said paddleboarding is great fun for people of various ages and fitness levels. The Board House's TAO Fit SIC boards, most ranging in length from 10 to 12 feet, are sturdy and not prone to tipping. The business now features 39 10to 12-foot boards, up from 25, plus one 14-foot Maori board, which can carry up to six peo-

One-, two- and three-hour rentals of the 10- to 12-foot boards will be \$25, \$45 or \$55 plus tax. Rental includes board, paddle, leash and flotation vest. Weekday early-bird specials will be available from 7 to 10 a.m. for \$15, \$25 and \$35, respectively. For other details, paddletheboardhouse. boardhouse on Instagram.

"At the heart of it all, our goal is to create a space where everyone feels welcome and inspired to get out on the water," Dunn said. "We want to be more than just a rental service - we want to be a part of our community's story.

Three Oaks Recreation Area, which offers a range of activities, is located at 5517 Route 14 in Crystal Lake. Vehicles belonging to non-Crystal Lake residents incur a \$5 parking fee.

electric scooter crash A 53-year-old McHenry man has died following a single-vehicle electric scooter

crash that occurred May 24 in the 5000 block of Wildwood Drive, located in unincorporated McHenry County.

At 10:03 a.m., emergency personnel from the McHenry County Sheriff's Office, Island Lake Police Department, and Wauconda Fire District responded to the scene of the incident involving a Segway eKick Scooter ZT3 Pro.

Preliminary findings indicate that the scooter was traveling southbound on Wildwood Drive when, for reasons still under investigation, the operator was ejected from the unit and landed in the roadway. The rider was not wearing a helmet at the time of the crash.

The 53-year-old operator, identified as the sole occupant

of the scooter, was transported iff's to Advocate Good Shepherd conducted Hospital in Barrington, where he was later pronounced deceased.

The incident remains under investigation by the McHenry County Sheriff's Office Major Traffic Crash Investigation Unit in coordination with the Lake County Coroner's Office.

Court grants petition to detain Christensen for three counts of aggravated battery

The McHenry County State's Attorney's Office announced that the Honorable Judge Jeffrey J. Altman granted the State's motion to deny pretrial release for Wayne John Christiansen, 78, reportedly homeless. Christensen appeared in Initial Appearance Court on June 5, charged with three counts of Aggravated Battery.

Evidence presented in court on the afternoon of June 5, established that these charges stem from an investigation by the McHenry County Sheron the evening June 4. Christiansen and another man were reportedly traveling in unincorporated McHenry

County, near Union, when an argument ensued, and Christiansen reportedly struck the man in the head multiple times with a hammer.

At the hearing, evidence presented regarding Christiansen's extensive criminal history dating back to Amongst numerous other charges, Christiansen was previously sentenced to 12 years in the Department of Corrections for the offense of Attempted Murder. McHenry County State's

Fatal crash involving motorcycle under investigation

On May 25, at the intersection of Johnsburg Road and Miller Road in unincorporated McHenry County, a 27-yearold McHenry man was pronounced deceased following a two-vehicle collision involving a motorcycle and a passenger vehicle.

At 3:03 p.m., emergency personnel from the McHenry County Sheriff's Office, Johnsburg Police Department, McHenry County Conservation District, McHenry Township Fire Protection District and Spring Grove Fire Protection District responded to the scene of the crash.

Preliminary investigation indicates that a 2009 Kawa-

ing southbound on Johnsburg Road when it collided with the driver's side of a 2021 Honda Civic, which was turning north onto Johnsburg Road from Miller Road. The impact caused both vehicles to come to rest within the intersection.

The motorcyclist, who was wearing a helmet and was the sole occupant of the Kawasaki, was transported to Northwestern Medicine McHenry Hospital, where he was pronounced deceased.

The 17-year-old driver of the Honda Civic was also transported to Northwestern Medicine McHenry Hospital with minor injuries. The 45-year-old passenger in the Civic was not injured. Both occupants were wearing seatbelts, and the vehicle's airbags deployed as a result of the crash.

The speed of the motorcycle is believed to be a contributing factor in the crash. The incident remains under active investigation by the MCSO Major Traffic Crash Investigation Unit and the McHenry County Coroner's Office.


