

Drawing discipline: A peek inside Alex Ross' creative world

Comic book artist Alex Ross is known for painting superheroes with striking realism. His work gives icons such as Superman and Batman a lifelike presence, blending fine art techniques with comic book storytelling.

The Dunn Museum in Libertyville is opening a new gallery and launching 'Alex Ross: Heroes & Villians' as its first special exhibition. Visitors will experience never-before-seen artwork by the celebrated artist.

Known for using gouache paints to create detailed portraits of Marvel and DC characters, Ross has helped elevate the comic book world to the realm of fine art. The exhibition runs June 29 through February 16, 2026.

Ross created two new paintings just

for the show –'Harley Quinn' and 'The Joker' displayed side by side. "These crazy popular DC villains have never been seen before," said Steve Furnett, exhibitions and collections manager. Prints of the Batman villains will be available in the Dunn Museum store, with some autographed.

Ahead of the exhibition, Ross visited the Dunn Museum for a private book signing, where Forest Preserves staff asked him a few questions. In a voice fit for a superhero, he shared insights on his career, influences and creative process. The following has been edited for length and clarity.

When did you start drawing? At three years old, I picked up a piece of paper and drew what I saw in a TV commercial, completely by memory.

How did your interest in comics begin? As a kid, I watched The Electric Company and was completely captivated by Spider-Man. I remember thinking, "If I could be that character, that would be the coolest, most exciting thing ever."

What was next? By the time I was a teenager, I was writing and drawing my own original comic books.

Where did you go to school and what came after that? I studied illustration at the American Academy of Art in Chicago. After I graduated in three years, I launched my career. At 23, Marvel hired me to illustrate its central characters for the Marvels comic book event.

What fuels your creativity and drive? Discipline. You have to have it. I've seen incredibly talented people struggle because they lacked it. For me, it's an inner drive—I'm always pushing myself forward.

What's your typical workday look like? I usually work from my home studio about 8 to 10 hours a day. My focus hours are 1–5 pm and then again overnight, from 10 pm to 4 am. Those quiet windows let me really lock in without distractions.

Did you like the Dunn Museum

special exhibition that featured artist Bob Ross? I really enjoyed that exhibit. What he did was glorious. He captivated audiences of all ages through his television series. He made art feel approachable.

His work is quite different from yours. Very different. His paintings were created in about an hour on TV, so the fine detail isn't there. His backgrounds are mostly skies and grass. In contrast, my comic work features

"They have a lot of terrific bands, and a great outdoor performance area," the Trout Valley resident said of Sideouts, located at 4018 W. Roberts Road, Island Lake. "The staff there absolutely go out of their way to be friendly and attentive. The food is really good, too.'

Neil said he catches bands and hangs out with friends at Sideouts at least a couple of times a month. He's seen the Freddy Jones Band, Terrapin Flyer and numerous other acts there, and keeps an eye on the schedule at 3dsideouts.com for what's coming

And what's coming up won't disappoint, no matter one's musical tastes. 3D Sideouts owner Jerry DeLaurentis said.

"The question everyone asks is 'What kind of music do you have?" he said. "Our band schedule appeals to everyone. We feature some country, some classic rock, pop-punk, we have tribute bands and national acts, Thursdays, '50s, acoustic '60s and rockabilly bands on Sundays ...

Among the exciting upcoming acts will be Louder Now with Burning Cactus on Friday night, July 18. Billed as an ultimate pop-punk and emo night, the music starts at 7 p.m. Also that weekend, an Icons of Country night is slated for Saturday, July 19. Luke Bryan, Jason Aldean and Zac Brown Band tributes begin at 6 p.m.

Along with the terrific regional and national acts, what makes his venue stand out is the raised patio stage, impeccable sound system and seating options, DeLaurentis said.

"I do believe we have the No. 1 outdoor stage and seating setup of the Chicago suburbs," he said. "With our multi-level patios, party decks and gazebo seating, the sight lines and the sound are just better here. There really isn't a bad seat.

Serrano sentenced to fifteen years for armed violence and possession with the intent to deliver

McHenry County State's Attorney Randi Freese announces that on June 27, Victor H. Serrano, 26, of Belvidere, Illinois, was sentenced to fifteen years in the Illinois Department of Corrections on one count of Armed Violence, a Class X felony, and one count of Possession with the Intent to Deliver a Controlled Substance, a Class 2 felony. Serrano was sentenced by the Honorable Judge Mark Gerhardt after entering a negotiated plea of guilty to both counts.

On June 21, 2024, officers from the Lake in the Hills Police Department observed a vehicle traveling at high speed well above the posted limit. The vehicle was observed to cause a multi-car accident. The driver of the vehicle fled on foot from the scene. Officers gave chase and eventually took the driver, who was identified as Victor Serrano, into custody. Along Serrano's path of flight, officers also located a firearm. A search of Serrano's vehicle found large quantities of cannabis and cocaine, a large sum of money, and two cellphones.

that will run concurrently to the sentence imposed on the Armed Violence count. Upon his release from custody, Serrano will be placed on Mandatory Supervised Release for a period of eighteen months.

State's Attorney Randi Freese commends the work done by the responding officers from the Lake in the Hills Police Department in protecting the community and for the apprehension of Serrano. 'Committing criminal acts while carrying a gun and while you are dealing illegal drugs is not going to be tolerated. We remain committed to aggressively prosecuting those that intend to disrupt the safety of our communities as this man did last June," said Freese.

Man sentenced to thirty-six years for attempted murder of his estranged wife to pour a margarita

McHenry County State's Attorney Randi Freese announces that on July 3, Mark Alex, 60, of Crystal Lake, Illinois, was sentenced to a combined thirty-six years in the Illinois Department of Corrections on two counts of Attempted Murder, eighteen years on each. The sentence was handed down by the Honorable Judge Mark Gerhardt who presided over a week-long jury trial followed by a sentencing hearing that took place last week.

At trial, prosecutors proved that just twenty minutes prior to arriving at his estranged wife's home for what was to be a child exchange, Alex had stopped at a local Home Depot and purchased a demolition hammer and hatchet. At some point, after the victim refused his sexual advances, Alex then attacked her first with the hammer, striking her multiple times on and about her head. The victim testified she then pretended to be dead until he then attempted

apprehended a short time later by officers from Crystal Lake, Algonquin, and the McHenry County Sheriff's Office.

The victim suffered multiple lacerations and puncture wounds to her head, face, and body. She also suffered significant episodes of syncope following the attack which required several days of hospitalization.

During arguments at the sentencing hearing Chief of Staff Ashley Romito asked for the maximum sentence of sixty years, thirty years on each Class X offense of Attempted Murder. Alex's attorney asked for the minimum of twelve years.

Truth-in-Sentencing will require that Alex serve 85 percent of his sentence prior to release from custody. Due to the judge's finding of severe bodily injury, Alex must serve each of the 18-year sentences consecutively. Upon release, he will be subject to a Mandatory Supervised Release period of eighteen months.

State's Attorney Freese commends the victim for her strength and courage in fighting off Alex and her patience throughout the pendency of this case. A special thank you to Victim Witness Coordinator Kelly Gallagher for her assistance in coordinating the witnesses for trial and for always being there for the victims.

This case was successfully prosecuted at trial by Chief of Staff Ashley Romito and First Assistant Ashur Y. Youash.

Convicted felon found guilty of shooting at 3 people, a building, and a home, during an hours long crime spree

McHenry County State's Attorney Randi Freese announces that Nicholas Lopardo, 27, of Lake Villa, Illinois has been found guilty of 25 counts including charges for shooting at 3 people, stealing a car, and damaging property at numerous locations following a bench trial before the Honorable Judge Tiffany Davis. The Honorable Judge Tiffany Davis has scheduled the matter for sentencing on September 19, 2025.

Over the course of the 10day bench trial, the State's Attorney's Office called 46 witnesses who described Lopardo's hours long rampage and the damage that he left behind. Evidence at trial established that on March 31, 2023, Lopardo came to McHenry to visit a friend. Following a day of drinking and drug use, Lopardo became upset when a woman denied his romantic advances. Enraged, Lopardo fired numerous gunshots toward the friend's home before departing in his vehicle. A McHenry City Police officer located Lopardo and his vehicle as it was leaving the area. The officer attempted to stop the vehicle, but Lopardo fled from the officer at a high rate of speed.



do's vehicle pulled into a yard at a residence in unincorporated McHenry. Lopardo abandoned

street to a residence where he broke into a garage and stole a vehicle. He then fled the area at a high rate of speed.

Lopardo drove the stolen vehicle to a nearby conservation property where he plowed through a closed front gate and ran the vehicle into a closed garage door. He shot into a building on the conservation property numerous times. Lopardo also drove onto a nearby farm, crashing into property on the farm, causing extensive damage.

The McHenry County Sheriff's Office was dispatched to the residences in unincorporated McHenry where Lopardo's vehicle was found, and the other vehicle was stolen. A deputy with the McHenry County Sheriff's Office was driving down Barreville Road in a marked squad vehicle with lights acti-

vated when he passed Lopar- his gun in a yard, next to a do in the stolen vehicle. Lopardo fired a .357 revolver at the deputy, narrowly missing the deputy and instead striking the rear driver's side door. Lopardo abandoned the stolen vehicle in a ditch off nearby State Park Road. While on foot, Lopardo again fired his .357 revolver numerous times at a woman driving on State Park Road. The woman was working during the early morning hours, delivering newspapers. Lopardo then walked a short distance to the intersection of Barreville Road and State Park Road. Once there, he fired his .357 at a detective from the McHenry City Police Department who was driving down Barreville Road. The bullet missed the detective by inches, striking the moving vehicle on its rear driver's side door. Following these shoot-

ings, Lopardo entered a nearby neighborhood where he continued his crime spree by firing his gun into a house. Lopardo ran up and down the streets of the neighborhood, attempting to enter multiple homes. In the process Lopardo broke windows on 5 houses and otherwise damaged homes or fences at 4 additional homes. He abandoned

child's outdoor toys. By the time Lopardo was located and detained, more than one hundred police officers were dispatched to the neighborhood where he was found.

During closing arguments, Freese referred to Lopardo's actions that evening as a "four-hour reign of terror" in the city of McHenry. Freese is grateful for the tremendous efforts of the McHenry Police Department, the McHenry County Sheriff's Department, and members of the Northern Illinois Police Alarm System (NIPAS) in apprehending Lopardo without serious injury to anyone involved. She wishes to commend all members of law enforcement for their investigation of this case and their testimony at trial. Freese also wishes to thank and congratulate McHenry County State's Attorney's Office Victim Witness Coordinator Kelly Gallagher for her extensive work in coordinating the preparation and testimony of the witnesses called during Lopardo's trial.

This case was prosecuted by the McHenry County State's Attorney Randi Freese and Deputy Criminal Chief Brian Miller.

June 30, a Lake County Sheriff's Deputy, Ari Briskman, is suing Lake County Sheriff John Idleburg and Lake County State's Attorney, Eric Rinehart for political retaliation and for violating his First Amendment rights of free speech and association.

Lake County State's Attorney, Eric Rinehart, a Democrat, ran for re-election in the November 2024 General Election. His opponent was Republican

The suit alleges that Idleburg, a staunch supporter of Rinehart and fellow Democrat, then launched an investigation into Cole's campaign and Briskman " for the purpose of chilling Briskman's free speech" and "deterring Briskman and other sheriff's deputies and/or like-minded supporters from participating in or supporting

the complaint.

The suit alleges that Briskman, like many other law enforcement officers in Lake County, felt Rinehart was soft on crime and disagreed with Rinehart's support of the Safe-T Act — two contentious issues in the 2024 campaign. Rinehart and embattled Cook County State's Attorney Kim Foxx were the only two State's Attorneys in the entire state to support the Safe-T Act when it

passed.

The Complaint also alleges that Rinehart consorted with Idleburg in generating the complaint and "working together orchestrated the disciplinary action against Briskman."

"Sgt. Briskman had the same First Amendment rights as every other citizen in Lake County - to support the candidate of his choice" said Keith Hunt, Briskman's attorney. "But the Sheriff and State's Attorney used their offices to

punish Briskman and to others from supporting Mary Cole" Hunt added. "All I ever wanted to do was to continue to do my job and serve the citizens of Lake County" Briskman said. The suit alleges that the day after Rinehart won re-election, the Sheriff demoted Briskman.

The Complaint in the current case seeks unspecified compensatory and punitive damages and reinstatement. The case has been assigned to US District Court Judge Jorge Alonso.
