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McHenry Outdoor launches sensory-friendly Wednesdays

Finding entertainment options suitable for a special-needs child was a challenge as Angela Krambeer and her husband, Chris Krambeer, were raising their youngest son, Dylan, now 23.

Dylan has Prader-Willi Syndrome, a genetic disorder characterized by low muscle tone, feeding difficulties, developmental delays, sometimes sensory challenges and other effects.

"We couldn't go out and enjoy the same things," the Crystal Lake mother said. "We didn't have access to play groups that would accommodate his needs. Libraries didn't have sensory story times for kids who couldn't sit still ... there wasn't a whole lot out there that we were comfortable with,

o we were a little more isolated."

An offering like the McHenry Outdoor Theater's new Sensory-Friendly Wednesdays will be a godsend for families like hers, said Krambeer, now a longtime employee of Options & Advocacy for McHenry County, where Dylan received services and now volunteers.


"Having a local business with such an influence in the community stepping up like this is a great show of support that hopefully will spill out into more community partners being aware and taking on the same stance for this population," Krambeer said. "It's a fantastic idea. I really respect that they're doing this."

Options & Advocacy's mission of inclusivity is something that Joe Cicero — who met Dylan when Dylan

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

THE WALL THAT HEALS




Irish Stew on Friday, August 1, 7-8:30 p.m.

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27 arrested in Lake County human trafficking suppression initiative

In continued efforts to there is no market." combat human trafficking, the Lake County Sheriff's Special Investigations Group (SIG) conducted a two-day human trafficking suppression operation this week, focused on reducing the demand for purchased sex. A total of 27 men were arrested during the operation.

The operation specifically targeted individuals attempting to purchase sex through online classified advertisements, a tactic regularly used by traffickers to market victims of human trafficking. Undercover detectives posed as individuals offering sex for money. When the offenders arrived at a Gurnee-area hotel, and offered money for sexual acts, they were arrested and transported to the Lake County

While some may perceive prostitution as a consensual transaction between adults, experience and investigative work have consistently shown that many individuals being sold for sex are not participating willingly. Traffickers often force victims into prostitution through physical violence, manipulation, fraud, or coercion. Many of these victims are vulnerable and live in fear of the repercussions they'll face if they do not comply, often being forced to surrender any money they receive to their trafficker.

"These operations are about protecting victims and holding sex buyers accountable," said Lake County Sheriff John D. Idleburg. "Suppressing the demand is a critical piece of dismantling the human trafficking

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Convicted felon charged after threatening others with knife

a 2017 stabbing of his roommate was arrested yesterday, with the assistance of sheriff's canines, after he threatened to stab people at the property where he was living.

On June 25, at approximately 9:40 a.m., Lake County Sheriff's

Deputies responded to an address in the 15900 block of West Wadsworth Road. Wadsworth, for an aggravated assault that just occurred. Sheriff's deputies arrived and learned that Joshua W. Marksberry. 39, of the same residence, had pulled a knife on a victim, threatened that victim, and also threatened to slit the throat of another person on the property.

Marksberry fled on foot, prior to the arrival of sheriff's deputies and he was not immediately located.

At approximately 8:30 p.m., a person matching Marksberry's description was seen in the area of Wadsworth Road and Dilleys Road. Sheriff's deputies arrived and established a perimeter around the area. Lake County Sheriff's

Canine Danno/Deputy Andrew Martini searched the inside of the perimeter. While searching, Canine Hemi led deputies toward a tent in a wooded area on the property. Sheriff's deputies made announcements for Marksberry to exit the tent, which he did, and he was taken into custody without incident.

After reviewing the facts and circumstances of the incident, the Lake County State's Attorney's Office approved the charges of Unlawful Use of a Weapon by a Felon (class 3 felony) and Aggravated Assault with a Deadly Weapon (class A misdemeanor).

Sheriff John D. Idleburg said, "We are very pleased our Patrol Division and Canine Teams were able to successfully apprehend this violent man, before someone was seriously injured or worse. Great job to Canines Hemi and Danno and congratulations to Canine Hemi on his first track resulting in a find!"

Marksberry remains held in the Lake County Jail pending an initial court hearing this morning. The Lake County State's Attorney's Office intends to file a petition to detain Marksberry while awaiting trial.

McHenry County State's Attorney Randi Freese announced that on June 13, Fernando Esquivel, 50, of Harvard, Illinois, was sentenced to ten years in the Illinois Department of Corrections on two counts of Criminal Sexual Assault, a Class 1 felony. Esquivel was sentenced by the Honorable Judge Mark Gerhardt after entering a negotiated plea of guilty to both

In April of 2024, the Harvard Police Department began investigating a report of sexual assault of a child. During the investigation, it was discovered that Esquivel had been assaulting two minor female victims between January 1, 2022, through

Truth-in-Sentencing will require that Esquivel serve a minimum of 85 percent of his sentence. Upon his release from custody, Esquivel will be placed on Mandatory Supervised Release for a period of between three years to natural life. He will also be re-

Man sentenced to nineteen years

McHenry County State's Attorney Randi L. Freese announced that on June 12, Rufus L. McGee, 34, of Chicago, was sentenced to nineteen years in the Illinois Department of Corrections for the offenses of Drug In-

duced Homicide and Unlawful Delivery of a Controlled Substance. McGee was sentenced by the Honorable Judge Tiffany Davis after entering a negotiated plea of Illinois. The guilty.

partment. The investigation was turned over to the Illinois State Police North Central Narcotics Task Force. The Task Force discovered that, on May 27, 2019, the deceased traveled with three other people to Oak Brook, Illinois. While there, the deceased and her companions met with McGee, or an individual dealing drugs on his behalf, who sold them heroin laced with fentanyl. The de-

Throughout the investigation, the Task Force learned that McGee, who operated under the street name "Mello", conducted an elaborate drug dealing scheme throughout the northwest Chicago suburbs. Evidence showed that McGee, and his associates, sold drugs in Cook, DuPage and Kane Counties. While McGee's group

al Day the unofficial start of summer as we see consistently warmer weather and the start of swimming season. Whether enjoying the waters at your local pool or your favorite beach, it is important to protect yourself from illness, prevent the spread of germs, and practice safe swimming.

es (RWIs) can spread if you swallow, have contact with, or breathe in mists or aerosols from water contaminated with germs. You can also get them by having contact with chemicals that are in the water or that evaporate from the water and turn into gas in the air.

The Lake County Health Department monitors lake water for E.coli bacteria in over 100 Lake Michigan and inland lake beaches to ensure that the water is acceptable for swimming. From Memorial Day to Labor Day, beach closure information can be found Diarrhea is the most common through the interactive map

on the Health Department's Beach Monitoring and Advisories web page at https:// www.lakecountyil.gov/2385/ Beach-Monitoring-and-Advisories, which is updated daily by 10:00 a.m.

When bacteria levels are high, the Health Department notifies the beach's manager, and signs are posted indicating a swim ban is in place. surf (i.e., high waves), which Water samples are taken daily until the bacteria levels fall below the standard.

"Recreational water illnesses can not only hamper your summer plans, but they can also get others sick," said Alana Bartolai, Ecological Services Program Coordinator. "We monitor the water quality to ensure that individuals and families can enjoy the many beautiful lakes and beaches in Lake County to their fullest."

- Don't swim or let your children swim when sick with Beach, Winthrop Harbor
 - Don't swallow the water.
- Take children on bathroom breaks every 60 minutes.
- · Check diapers every 30-60 minutes and change them in a bathroom or diaper-changing area—not waterside—to keep germs away from the water.
- Shower before you enter the water.
- Never swim alone.

- Avoid swimming in lakes after a large rain event, since rainfall can wash pollutants into lakes resulting in elevated bacteria levels.

never sold drugs in McHenry County, they regularly sold drugs to McHenry County residents. The investigation showed that their sales were directly related to a Harvard man's death in March of 2019. That death was investigated by the Harvard Police Department in cooperation with the North Central Narcotics Task Force. Ultimately, McGee pled guilty to Drug Induced Homicide in relation to the woman who died in Algonquin. He pled guilty to Unlawful Delivery of a Controlled Substance in connection to the death of the man in Harvard.
